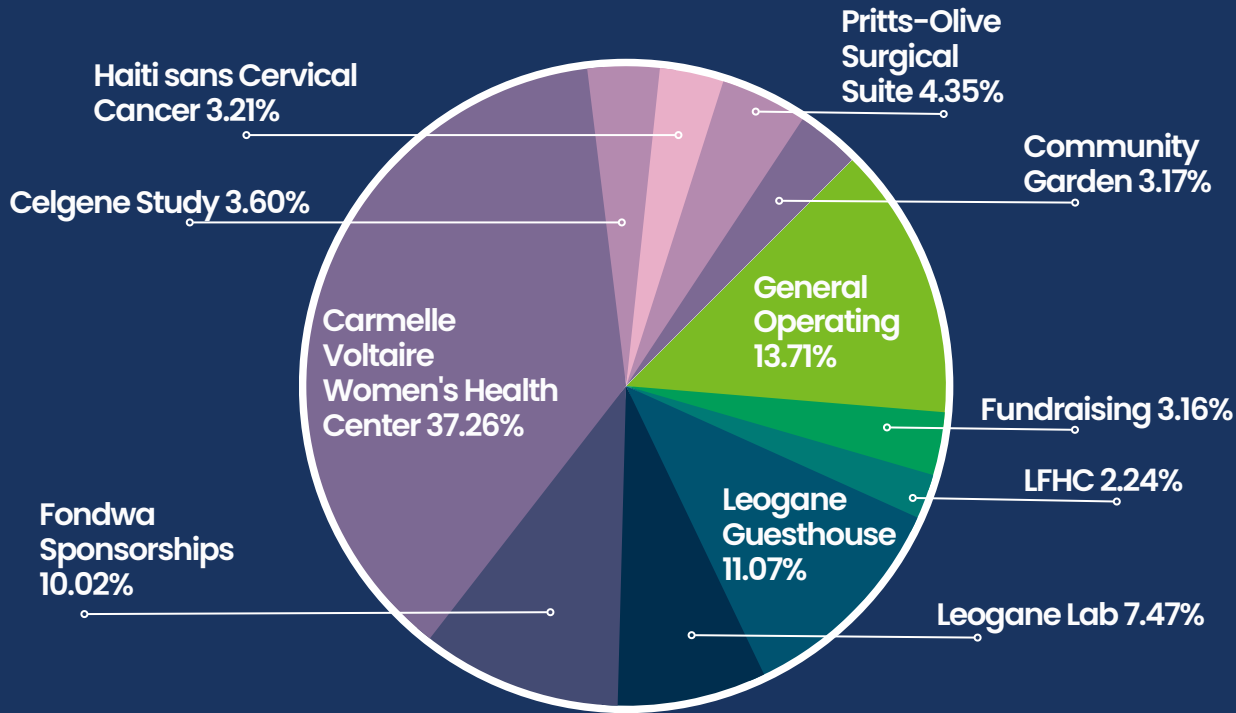

A Message From the CVWHC

FHM Physician, Dr. Danache

"I am Dr. Danache. I am an OB/GYN doctor and I have worked for Family Health Ministries for 7 years at the Carmelle Voltaire Women's Health Center (CVWHC). On March 8, 2023, we celebrated International Women's Day at the Center.

This is a day to support women's rights. This means the rights to education, life, and healthcare. In Haiti, women often do not have the same rights as men. As a doctor, it is my responsibility to provide women with quality healthcare. It is important to have a center like the CVWHC where we can provide for the specific needs of women, including safe delivery of their babies.

It is everyone's responsibility to protect women's rights to have the same resources available to them as men. Thank you for supporting the CVWHC and the rights of women in Haiti."



Cervical Cancer Screening

Healthcare delivery in Haiti is fragmented and broken. At Family Health Ministries, we have a dream of creating fundamental change that can lead to functional healthcare systems. FHM and the Haiti sans Cervical Cancer (HsCC) consortium continue to work together to inspire change. Historically, there has been little to no collaboration between the Haitian Ministry of Health, the NGO community, Haitian medical societies, and community advocacy groups. With HsCC, FHM has been working to bring these groups together to pool resources, create infrastructure, develop standards of care, and coordinate healthcare delivery around cervical cancer. This project could be a model for healthcare delivery for things like childhood vaccines and hypertension treatment.

In order to continue our effort during this time of political unrest, HsCC is planning to meet at the Duke Global Health Institute in Durham in 2023. We will provide updates on our latest attempts to *support Haitian communities in their efforts to build and sustain healthy families.*



Community Garden Program

Last year, in response to the food crisis in Leogane, FHM launched our Community Garden project. Increased gang activity has made it difficult to get goods to the countryside from Port-au-Prince. We saw a need and decided to take action. Our Community Garden has given local merchants a place to purchase wholesale produce to sell in their markets. We are employing farmers to plant, tend, and harvest the crops. Our recent tomato harvest has been so successful, we are sharing produce with our staff, the Children's Nutrition Program of Leogane, and the School and Children's Home in Fondwa. We have plans to expand this part of the program. We are excited to announce our lead farmer, Jameson Avril, is the winner of the Grand-Goave Global Award for 2022. This award recognizes Jameson for his agricultural expertise and commitment to his community.



A Note from Michael Anello, In-Country Director

"This past year has been extremely difficult in Haiti. Food shortages, gang violence, and political instability have made daily life challenging. It is impossible for mission teams to visit. Sadly, there does not seem to be a resolution in sight.

At FHM, we continue to accomplish much amidst the turmoil. We are providing quality healthcare at the Carmelle Voltaire Women's Health Center. Our medical team provides a broad range of women's health services, including cervical cancer screenings. Labor and delivery services continue to be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

In response to the food shortage, we started a Community Garden on our property in Leogane. This garden provides food to a variety of community organizations, families in need, and to our staff. We also continue our partnership with the Fondwa Sisters in support of the St. Antoine School and Orphanage.

We could not continue to do this work without the support of people like you. We thank you and pray that the situation here resolves, and we can welcome you back to Haiti soon."



New Programs and Projects in 2023

- In May, FHM will launch a **Plumpy Nut** program at the Carmelle Voltaire Women's Health Center. Plumpy Nut is a ready-to-use food supplement used in pregnant and lactating women in order to promote proper development of the fetus and infant while reducing the incidence of acute malnutrition during periods of great risk.
- FHM hopes to break ground on the **Pritts-Olive Surgical Suite** at the Carmelle Voltaire Women's Health Center.
- We will support **nursing scholarships** at the Leogane School of Nursing.
